ASSIGNMENT

1. Assigned Target: ORANIENBURG, GERMANY (Ordnance Depot)
2. Commitments: The 401st Group furnished the complete 36 A/C 94th "B" Group. One PFF and one PFF-GH were included in the lead squadron, a PFF-GH in the low and a PFF in the high. A spare accompanied both lead and high squadrons.

3. Flight Over England:

a. Takeoff:

The weather was good for take off and all ships took off successfully. The group was briefed to assemble at 8,000', but followed the weather ship recommendation and formed at 7,000', under a cloud layer.

Mission Summary Report (Cont'd)

3. b. Squadron and Group Assemblies:

The group made an excellent assembly, having 36 aircraft plus a spare in the lead and high squadrons, approximately ten minutes before departure time. Left buncher on time, on course.

c. Route Over England:

94th "B" group fell in behind "A" group after first turn. "C" group had to "S" once to get in position. "A" group made a double drift, just before leaving the coast to get into Division column. (94th "B" was # 8 in column) All three groups left the English coast in good formation.

4. Attack:

a. Flight to Target:

94th "B" group stayed slightly to the left of "A" group to avoid prop wash during route in. The lead ship climbed at 150 MPH, 250', 1 minute maximum yet the squadrons could not keep in formation on climb. We did not reach bombing altitude (25,000) until about two minutes after IP. The low squadron was too far back at the IP so the high squadron bombed second, before the low. On bomb run two ships from high squadron, who could not keep formation, dropped down and joined the lead squadron. One other ship followed the low squadron and dropped on smoke markers.

b. Bombing Run:

Backeye called that bombing would be hisual. The group uncovered at the IP and began the run into the target. The target was identified right away after the IP, the actual MPI was picked up about two minutes prior to bombs away. Synchronization was normal, bomb results were observed to be fair. C-1 was used by all squadrons.

c. Flight from Target:

Group lost 5,000' on turn off target as briefed and the squadrons made a good rally. Route out was SOP and division column was good. Let down to 3,000' over channel.

d. Return to Base:

Group crossed in at 3,000' and held that altitude to group break-up point. High and low squadrons proceeded to stand off points and lead let down directly to the base. One ship landed on continent and one is as yet unaccounted for.

e. Weather:

Weather was CAV U enroute and over target. UPON leaving target, dense cloud bank was observed coming in from north but parallel to course so it caused no difficulty.

f. Fighter Support:

4. g. Comments on Formation and Interval:

The division formation was good entire mission. Squadrons loosened up on the climb but held good formation on the route out.

h. Conclusions and Recommendations:

In view of the difficulties individual ships had in maintaining formation during climb, recommend more time being given for climb with that heavy loading (8-500 GP's and 4-500 IB's)

All scheduled aircraft attacked the target.

10. Bombing Data:

a. Observations:

Pattern of lead squadron was about 500' over the assigned MPI; low squadron's bombs appeared to have hit MPI with most of patter about 800' over; high squadron hit to left, accurate assessment difficult to determine.

b. Disposition of Bombs:

Lead Squadron:

All 12 scheduled A/C of the lead squadron attacked the target, dropping 11 X 500# RDE, 83 X 500# GP and 48 X 500# IB. The spare returned 8 X 500X gp and 4 X500# IB bombs.

Low Squadron:

All 12 scheduled A/C of the low squadron attacked the target, dropping 61 X 500# RDX, 34 X 500# GP and 48 X 500# IB bombs.

10. b. High Squadron:

All 12 scheduled A/C of the high squadron attacked the target, dropping 11 X 500# GP, 84 X 500# RDX and 48 X 500# IB bombs. The spare returned 8 RDX and 4 IB bombs to base.

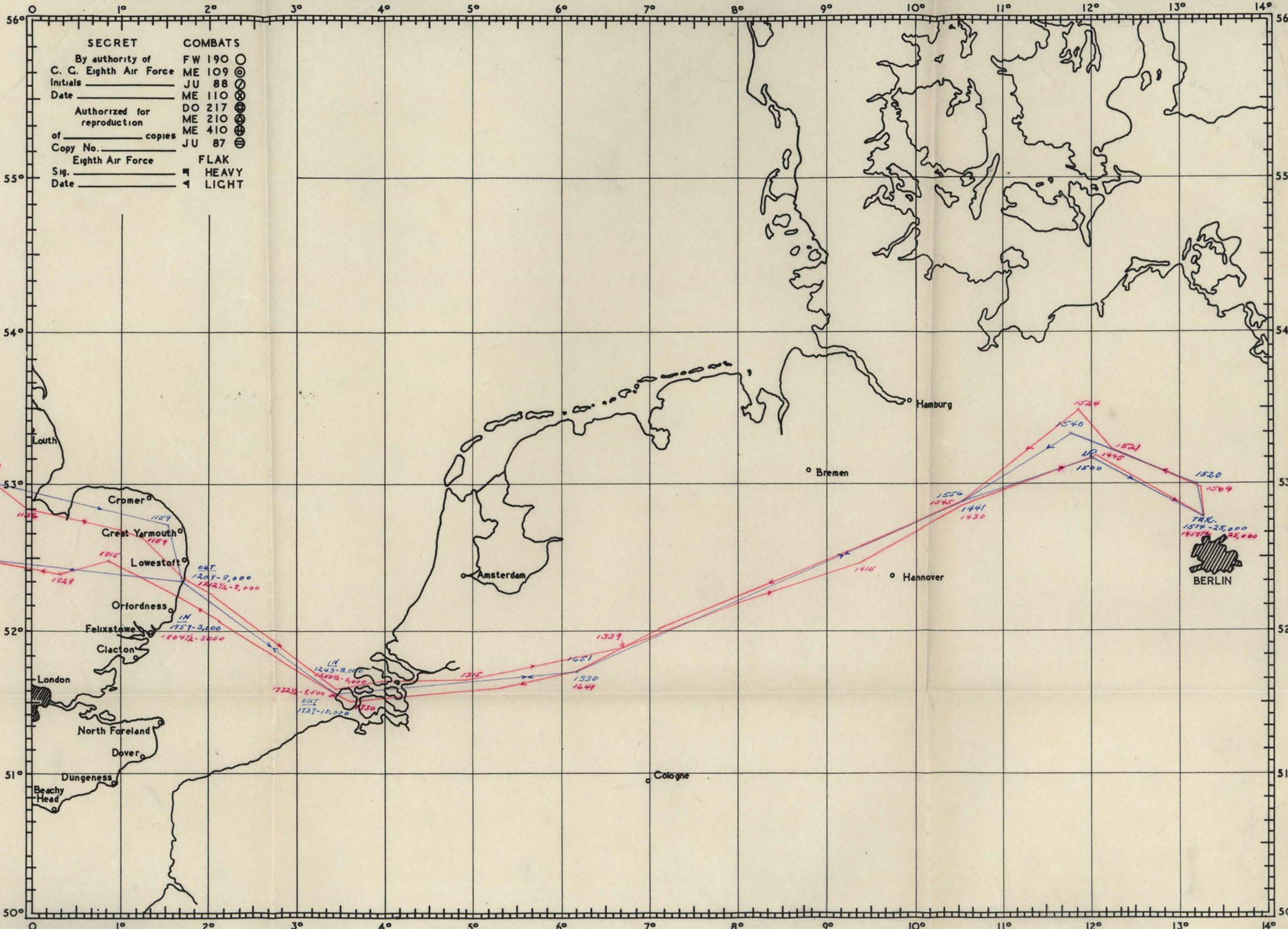

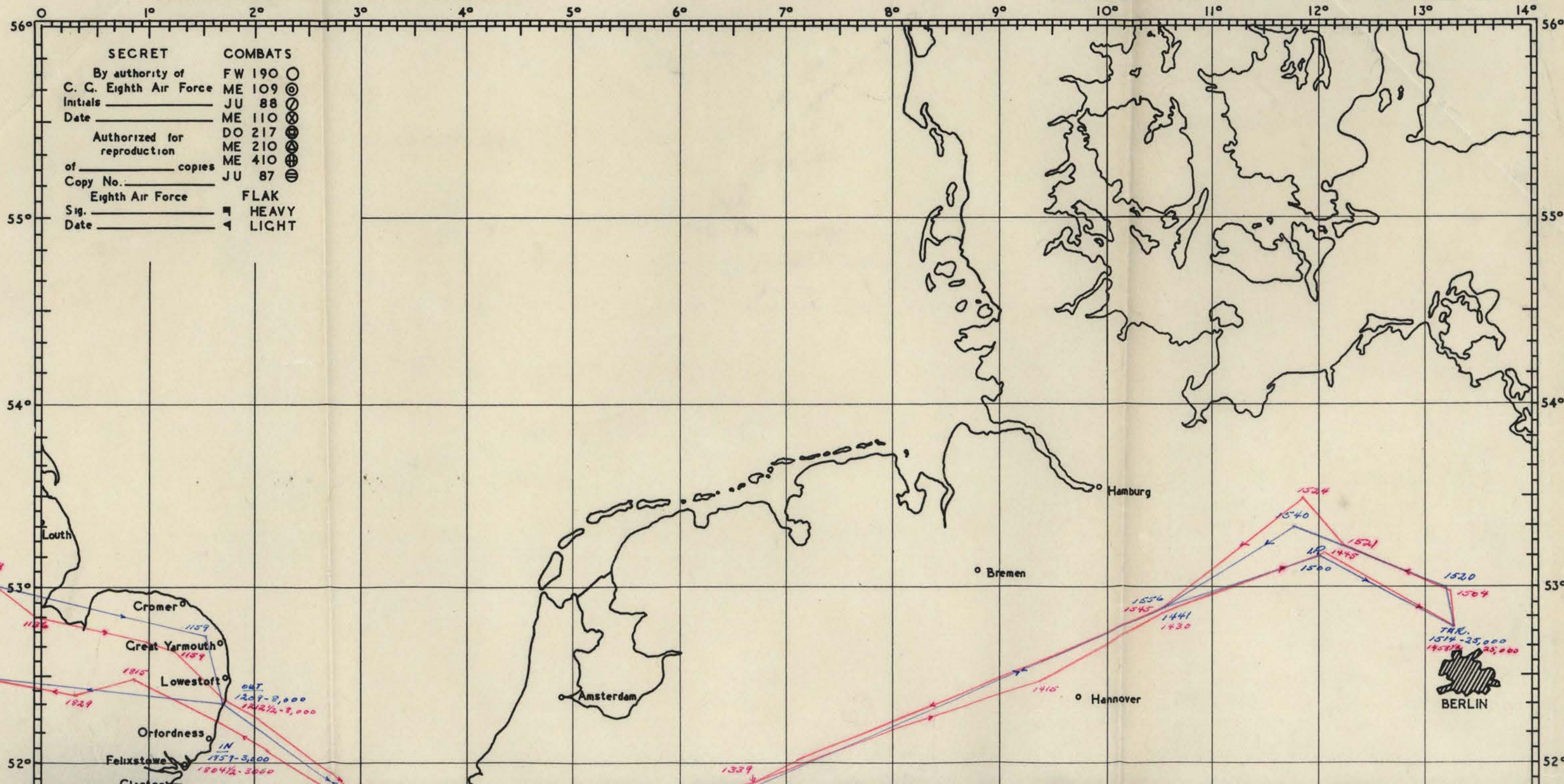

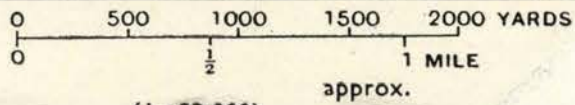

1. Airplane No. 42-31891 returned early from mission of 9 April 1945 after approximately 5 hours in flight.

2. The plane had been in flight for about 4 hours when suddenly the # 4 generator started to hog the load. When ammeter reading was 300 amps. the generator switch was turned off. The pilot said that the engineer attempted to adjust voltage regulators in order to parallel the remaining three operating generators.

3. About 1 hour after the # 4 generator was turned off all electrically operated equipment went dead and the HCM equipment was seen smoking. The inboard superchargers started to run away. At this time it was observed that there was no amperage reading on generators 1,2 and 3. Very shortly thereafter the # 3 generator started to produce power. With a load of 75 to 80 amps. on the # 3 generator the pilot had all equipment operating except power turrets.

4. The pilot then turned back.

5. Ground check revealed the following facts: # 1,2 and 4 generators were burned out. # 1,2,3 and 4 voltage regulators were found adjusted to maximum output of voltage. Batteries # 2 and 4 were damaged to the point of necessary replacement caused probably by too high voltage and too rapid a charge. New generators and new voltage regulators were installed and the electrical system checked O.K. on ground.

6. Plane is being held for test-hop.

7. Trouble probably was caused by attempt to parallel the generators by adjusting voltage regulators.
